As we work with, dialogue with and mentor the youth in our support groups, we can see the hope, the spark, the creativity and the energy. The Orlando Youth Alliance knows that we are helping to develop the leaders of tomorrow. In 2020, the Orlando Youth Alliance made the adjustment to virtual. This brought with it challenges and opportunities. Some of our youth who regularly attended started voicing "Zoom-fatigue" after being on virtual platforms all day for school and at nights for OYA. But being virtual did allow us to connect and help youth from outside our normal geography. We interacted with youth from South Carolina, Texas and Canada. They all had friends in Central Florida or plan to move here after the pandemic.

In our 30th year we continued to rise up. Our dedicated volunteers gave hundreds of hours to create those safe spaces for our youth. We thank them for their time and dedication. Our financial health is strong. We appreciate our donors who believe in our mission.

We facilitated over 108 support group meetings throughout the year; hosted Friday night dropins to provide a safe and social setting for youth to gather until that pandemic came along; coordinated engaging virtual activities for our youth to celebrate themselves and build that very important network of support; provided grants to fund the creation and ongoing missions of Gay-Straight Alliances/Gender Sexuality Alliances throughout Central Florida; and provided three scholarships to LGBTQ+ youth to support their post-secondary academic pursuits. On behalf of our Board, volunteers, and over 100 Central Florida youth with whom we have the privilege of working, thank you for your continued support as we pursue our mission to facilitate the development of LGBTQ+ youth and provide a safe space for them to find the support they need to thrive.

MISSION

The mission of the Orlando Youth Alliance and its chapters is to provide a safe space for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and questioning youth in Central Florida.

BASIC OVERVIEW OF OYA

The Orlando Youth Alliance has offered a weekly peer-to-peer support group for LGBTQ youth in Central Florida since 1990. Today, three weekly groups are offered: Orlando, Lakeland and Longwood. Monthly social, educational and recreational activities occur to further help our youth to develop a core group of friends and peer supporters. In addition to the support group and activities, OYA provides LGBT History & Culture classes, scholarships, mental health referrals and career exploration. Numerous professionals have spoken to our youth about their careers and the options that await them. Developing this nucleus of friends is the key to never feeling alone. Since LGTBQ youth are five times more likely to commit suicide than their heterosexual classmates, it is vital that we provide the services of OYA to our area youth.

The impact of OYA: Over the past 30 years we have helped 2,000 youth and only lost one to suicide.

VOLUNTEERS TRAINED IN GENDER DIVERSITY AND SUICIDE PREVENTION

OYA volunteers learned to better serve our youth in a relaxed small-group setting. Since many OYA youth identify as transgender or gender diverse, volunteers reviewed current language around gender identity and sexual orientation. They deepened their understanding of gender role expectations in society, and became more attuned to the unique experiences of trans and gender diverse youth.

OYA volunteers also earned certification in the QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer) method of suicide prevention. They practiced listening for the warning signs of suicide and connecting youth in crisis to community resources. Volunteers reported greater comfort and confidence with these lifesaving skills.



OYA VETTED MENTAL HEALTH REFERRAL PROGRAM

Orlando Youth Alliance welcomes local mental health professionals who have an interest in supporting the needs of LGBTQI+ youth to join our referral program. Such professionals are listed on our web site (www.orlandoyouthalliance.org) and on informational materials (e.g. brochures) so that our youth and their families may access them as needed.

Participating in the OYA referral program is free to you and requires that the following 5 criteria be met in order to be listed as a referral:

- A criminal background check (standard for all OYA volunteers and affiliates)
- A copy of your current license to practice counseling/psychotherapy
- **3.** Proof of malpractice insurance (e.g. a copy of your certificate)
- 4. A current fee schedule
- **5.** A statement that you repudiate aversion and reparative therapy

THE 1990'S

RICK CLAGGETT

I joined the Delta Youth Alliance (now the Orlando Youth Alliance) in 1991 at the age of 16. I spent the years leading up to this moment trying not to be who I was. There was no support system for me at that time. Every indication from my surroundings told me there was something wrong with me. Every night before bed, I would look in the mirror and beg myself to wake up normal. Each morning was met with the disappointment that nothing had changed. This went on for a long while before I hit a breaking point. I decided to seek help. I opened up the phone book and looked up the word "gay." It was there I found the Gay and Lesbian Community Services that led me to Delta Youth Alliance.

In the 90s, youth meetings were kept secret until a group facilitator could verify your reason for joining. I sat down with Delta Youth Alliance cofounder, Terry Deischer for the initial meetup. He was the first gay man I had ever met. From the moment he said hello to me, my life changed. He was so kind and caring and calming. I was petrified to admit I was gay and he put me at ease. From there we made our way to my first meeting. So much self hatred, so much self doubt, was lifted just sitting in a room with other gay kids going through exactly what I was going through.

The other cofounder,
Jeff Horn, became my
father away from home.
I can't imagine my life
without him. He pulled
me aside and told me
I could be anything I
wanted to be AND I
could be gay. Sounds
so simple now, but
hearing it in 1991 was



everything to me. This youth group validated me, gave me worth and inspired me to be who I am today.

Currently, I am the owner and publisher of Watermark, Central Florida and Tampa Bay's LGBTQ news source; a newspaper that was founded by another youth alliance mentor, Tom Dyer. I serve on the board of the Orlando Youth Alliance and the One Orlando Alliance. I have previously been on the board of the Pride Chamber and was a founding board member of Come Out With Pride. I have been named Business Man of the Year by the Pride Chamber, 40 under 40 by the Orlando Business Journal and named Orlando Trailblazer by the LGBT+ Center; and it all started with a meeting at a Subway Sandwich shop with the cofounder of the Orlando Youth Alliance.

THE 2000'S

KEN G. BARTON

Orlando Youth Alliance (OYA) was a formative part of my youth and young adulthood. I have life-long friends and connections that grew from the community it built. Probably most significant were the volunteers that were willing to sit with us, listen to our teenage melodrama and help guide us through thoughtful discussion on the experience / situation of the queer community. OYA was also a very unique and safe early exposure to sexualities that were not something I had ever heard of before; such as transgender people. This is a bit embarrassing to admit, but it was extremely valuable for me to meet queer adults that had careers outside of what we saw on television. As an Orlando Youth Alliance alumni, I recently donated for the first time to the organization and I am to be a lifelong contributor to the cause. Thank you again for providing me a safe space to meet real queer people, ask sometimes naive questions and grow as a young adult. I am forever grateful.

My name is Heather Marinello and I was a member (and later a facilitator) in OYA from 2006-2012. It meant the world to have friends and support. To be with people that were open minded and kind, and to find a safe space to talk freely about who you were as a person and what the hurdles are that you might face. With car washes, pride parades, dances, movie nights, gay days, and meetings, it felt like a family. I can say with most certainty they pushed me to be a strong person, an advocate. I went on to be president of a GSA at Valencia's west campus, to attending conferences with the

Florida Collegiate Pride Coalition at UCF, to representing an LGBTQ professional in my doctorate and being awarded the come out with pride scholarship. I don't think I could've done it without OYA setting the framework.

Brandon found the Orlando Youth Alliance (OYA) at a point in his life when he needed it the most.

He was homeschooled by his parents and raised in the church. When he finally decided to ask about "the gay thing," Brandon and his family's path changed forever.

"[The church] tried to pull me into reparative therapy," Brandon says. "Since I was a minor at the time they pulled my parents into it and tried to get them to be on their side. When they brought my parents in and said your daughter feels like she should have been born a boy, my dad was like 'This makes perfect sense.'"

Brandon's family came together and stepped away from the church, the only community they had known. That is when Brandon's family found PFLAG.

"When we came to PFLAG we were kind of broken," Brandon says of his family. "All we had known were the people in church. We went to PFLAG and met some great people and they said to me 'You should really go to this place called Orlando Youth Alliance,' they told me it was a youth group and my first thought was 'Great, I just got kicked out of a youth group.'"

From the first visit to OYA Brandon knew he was home.

"I absolutely fell in love with it," he says. "OYA was the most instrumental thing to happen to me in my transition. That was the first place I went where I was able to be respected for who I am and have my proper pronouns used."

Brandon has been involved with OYA for eight years and now serves as a support group facilitator for the organization. OYA CEO Michael Slaymaker even called Brandon the "poster child" for OYA. He was also a speaker at the Orlando Youth





Empowerment Summit, an event presented by the City of Orlando in collaboration with local governments and LGBTQ community organizations to empower Central Florida's LGBTQ youth.

"Because I am an outspoken individual when it comes to my story, I've done a lot of speaking engagements for OYA and been a mentor to so many of these kids who have come through," Brandon says. "To see kids starting T [testosterone shots] for the first time or going through their name change, it is almost like transitioning over again and that excitement of getting to be who you are. It's so inspiring for me."




OYA'S LARGEST GIFT

The largest gift OYA received in 2020 was the gift of volunteer time. OYA has over 30 volunteers who serve our youth on the board of directors, group facilitators, chaperones for activities, drop-ins, fundraising, marketing and program design and implementation. As of July 2020 the estimated national value of each volunteer hour is \$27.20. Our dedicated volunteers donated 2,269 hours to support the youth. That calculates to over \$61,716 in volunteer time to OYA and its chapters.
